There was never a dull moment as Len Podleski's attractive display evoked many questions from the crowd, and the service dogs interacted with children and their families. "Duke", the service dog GRKC purchased, was among the dogs present, and his handler, Officer Wierda, beamed proudly as he recounted some of Duke's accomplishments during the past year. The Club presented the K-9 Unit with a check for $\$ 5000$ plus several hundred more in donations collected during the weekend. Special thanks to Len Podleski, the event chair, and the members who helped to promote responsible dog ownership via this event, including Lucy Koch, Pat Kronemeyer, Jan Hamming, Char Czarnecki and friend Joan, Steve and Lindsey Tanyko, and Mike Lovett.

One of the most common questions at the Expo concerned Therapy Dog Work and how to become involved; and, coincidentally, the program for our April meeting will include that topic. Steve and Lindsey Tanyko, first time dog owners and new GRKC members, have done an amazing number of things with their 2 $1 / 2$ year old Golden Retriever, Jack. They will share their "Journey with Jack", which includes Jack's certification through West Michigan Therapy Dogs. Via their journey, we will also gain some insights into what it's like to be a young couple getting involved in the sport of dogs today and how we, as a club, can help others like them. Come and enjoy their presentation!

## Tricks Check List - NOVICE

(10 Tricks Required ; A CGC Title=5 tricks)
___ Balance beam (walk on board a few inches high)
___ Bark on cue ("Speak")
___ Crawl (on belly at least 5 feet)
___ Fetch \& Give (Bring toy to handler \& release)
___ Find it (Treat hidden under cup)
___ Get your $\qquad$ (leash, brush, name of toy)
___ Get in (Gets in box)
___ Get on (Low platform or step - 4 paws)
Hand signals (down, sit, or come)
High Five
$\qquad$ Hold (3 seconds)
Jump (thru low hoop or over low bar)
Kennel up (Go to crate; stay until released)
$\qquad$ Kiss (point to cheek)
Paws up (2 paws on low stool or step)
___ Push-ups (sit, down sit, down, sit down)
$\qquad$ Shake hands
__ Spin in circle

## Tricks Check List- INTERMEDIATE

(10 Tricks Required; Must have Novice Trick Dog Title; CGC not required)
___ Balance treat on nose or head (eg dog biscuit)
___ Carry (a basket) Catch (soft toy or soft ball)
Crawl (dog on belly at least 5 feet; may use lure) Fetch It (20 feet)
Game (manipulates interactive toy to get treat) Go find (handler hides; dog finds)

Go to your place (bed/mat, crate from 10 feet)
Hand signals (sit, down, stand, etc. 3 in a row) Jump through handler's circle arms Leg weave (weave around handler's legs) Paws up (on handler's arm) Pull a toy on a string or rope Push button on sound toy (piano, tape, etc.) Roll over
Shell game (Find treat under 1 of 3 cups) Sit pretty (sit up or w/head tilted)
Wave good-bye
Weave poles (6) (May use lure) Wobble board

## AKC TRICK DOG

## Tricks Check List- ADVANCED

(5 Tricks Required. Must have NOVICE \&
INTERMEDIATE TRICK DOG TITLES; CGC is not required)
___ Back up (Walk backwards)
Balance treat on nose, flip to eat at "OK"
__ Barrel (Roll w/2 paws or stand on it)
Bow (as in "Take a Bow")
___ Circle right, circle left
__Cover your eyes
___ Cover up with blanket
___ Go hide (under table)
__ Head down
Hide your head (under blanket, leg over head)
__ Jump into handler' arms
___ Jump over handler's back
Turn on light (pressure sensitive w/battery)
___ Open door \& get object (e.g. toy refrigerator) Play dead Scent articles (Choose from 5: dog can "read") Sit or down at distance ( 15 ft )
___ Tissue out of box (and bring to handler)
___ Toys (Take to box and drop in)
___ Weave poles (6) (No food or toy lures)
___ Other: Handler's choice
__ Other: Handler's choice

Ideas for Handler's Choice: Pull a cart, push a toy baby buggy, limping, yawn, sing/talk, dance, say your prayers, identify toys by name out of 3 toys, shake as in to shake off water, sneeze, smile, be ashamed, Bang! and fall over, take off handler's slippers, make your bed, dance/moonwalk.

For Advanced title, handlers may NOT use food or toys as lures. May use food rewards/clickers.

## Tricks check List - PERFORMER

- A total of 10 tricks from the Novice, Intermediate and Advanced titles are required to earn the Trick Dog Performer title.
- All three titles --- Novice, Intermediate, and Advanced must be on record at AKC
- The dog/handler team must perform a Tricks routine that includes at least 2 Intermediate and at least 2 Advanced Tricks.
- The routine may have a story (e.g., "This is my dog Princess. Princess loves school. Here's what she does at school. She plays ball on the playground and then she takes a nap, etc."
- If your routine has a story, write a summary to turn in to AKC.
- If your routine has a story, you can tell it yourself or you can have a narrator read the story to give you cues about the next trick.
- No food lures may be used in the Performer title. Food and/or clickers may be used as reinforcers for a correct response.
- TRICK DOG PERFORMER REQUIRES YOU TO PROVIDE A VIDEO FOR AKC TO VIEW. You can submit to Youtube, Facebook, (or other), provide a link, or send DVD.
- AKC Trick Dog Performer is not judged by an Evaluator. A video DVD or link is sent to the AKC Trick Dog department with the application.

## What to Do if Your Dog Gets Away From You

A dog owner's worst nightmare is losing her dog.

But accidents can happen. Your dog can slip past you when you open the door; slip out of his collar while on a walk; or dig or climb out of your fenced yard.

## What Should You Do if Yours Gets Loose?

Stay calm, even though your heart is racing with panic. Your dog will sense the fear in your voice and will ignore you or simply run faster. If you have taught him to come to you reliably, then call him cheerfully and beckon with your hand, as if you have a treat or toy. Try turning your back a little, as if to encourage him to follow you.

Do not chase him! Almost all dogs can run faster than almost all humans, and if he thinks you are chasing him, he'll simply run faster and with less care for where he's going. Walk or jog calmly, but quickly, and keep him in sight. If you've practiced recalls and he thinks you might have a delicious treat, he will most likely come to you. Keep treats near the front door, so they will be handy should he slip out when someone comes to visit.


Most dogs love to go for a ride in the car. If the dog is running loose and you spot him while driving around searching for him, simply pull over and get out (if it is safe to do so), open the door, and cheerfully invite him to jump in for a ride. I have "caught" two loose dogs that did not even know me this way! Most dogs apparently do not know that they should not take candy from strangers.Prevention is the most effective way to make sure this does not happen. Never let your dog off-leash outside a secure fenced area. Even the best-trained dog can forget everything he ever learned if he sees a squirrel or a cat. Also, consider your dog's breed. Hounds and terriers are very good at what they were bred to do: pursue their prey independently and singlemindedly. They follow their noses and can get into big trouble without a fence, and may be more likely to ignore your calls than, say, a sporting or working breed might be.

Use a secure collar when walking your dog. If you use a buckle collar, you should be able to get two fingers snugly under it and no more. Martingale collars are great, especially for dogs with narrow skulls. When adjusted properly, it's nearly impossible for a dog to back out of one. These collars are humane, and when fitted correctly will close tightly enough to prevent escape but not so tightly as to choke. Harnesses and head collars are also very secure. The collar should have identification on it.

If your dog gets lost without his collar and its identification tag, permanent identification such as a microchip and/or tattoo can help get him home. AKC Reunite is a service that keeps your essential contact information and enables anyone who finds your dog to return him safely to you. A veterinarian inserts a tiny microchip under the dog's skin, and almost every shelter and veterinary office has a scanner that can read the chip. This protection lasts for you dog's entire life.

Teach a reliable recall. Always be glad to see your dog when she comes to you, no matter what she may have done before she came. Practice calling her in distraction-free environments and gradually work toward more distracting ones. Don't be reluctant to use very high-value rewards for good recalls. Coming to you must be more rewarding than whatever your dog is currently up to. This will truly pay off when it really counts. Until she has a good recall, if your dog is in the fenced yard doing something fun like digging up a chipmunk, don't call -- simply go and get her and give her a treat for coming with you. Do not encourage the habit of ignoring you.

Never call the dog for something unpleasant, like a toenail trim or bath. Check out this article for ways to make your dog love coming to you.

The most frightening scenario is the one in which your dog gets loose and has a big head start. Maybe he has been gone for minutes, maybe hours, and you have no idea where he could be.

Act quickly. You should always have a good current photo of your dog. While you are out looking, a family member can whip up a flyer with the dog's picture to post all over the neighborhood, at nearby stores, the post office, and local veterinarian offices and shelters. Offer a reward for the dog's return. Check with the shelters frequently. Contact breed rescue groups.

Social media has helped many lost pets find their way back home. Take advantage of this resource right away if your dog is lost.

When the coin is flipped, and you find a lost dog, take him to a veterinarian or shelter where they will scan for a microchip. If he's lucky enough to have one, he will be on his way home. You will have made another dog owner very happy.
